From the Mayor's Desk...

Recently I had a breakfast/ coffee meeting with Dr. Michael Schilder Superintendent of Clinton Public School, during which we discussed several issues. We talk regularly on the phone insuring the utmost in communication between the Town and the School, as we both agree that while the community of Clinton is made up of many different areas, (ie: School, Municipal, Business, Residential), it is the successful combination of all aspects of the Town that make up Clinton, Dr. Schilder and I have committed to insure that both the Municipality and the School work in harmony, as both are factors in making Clinton such a desirable place to work, re-

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side, and raise our fami-

As part of keeping you all informed, I have outlined some of the projects that are currently being worked on.

#1 There are some long term talks and meetings concerning the eventual reworking of the Exit 17/18 areas of Rt. 78 assist in keeping "pass through" traffic out of Clinton. This is very long term, and is essentially in the infancy phase, however, we welcome any conversation on this topic with the State.

#2 Halstead Street Bridge will be replaced, however, most likely in 2005-2006. Our Sewer utility will be re-lining a sewer main on Halstead Street at some point this year.

#3 Construction on the Exit 15 intersection is still scheduled for later this year. While not a complete fix, this project represents the first of several phases of traffic solutions at the west end of Town.

#4 We will continue to work with the State, as we have for several years, in pushing for the extension road on the eastbound side of Rt. 78. While this issue has been on the drawing board for several years, it is the consistent pushing by Clinton officials that has forced it to now be a very real potential project, with a current time line of 4-5 years. Traffic studies indicate that it will have a positive effect in decreasing traffic in the Exit 15 intersection, and improving safety for all traveling through the area.

#5 Demott Pond Dam will be rebuilt in the fall of this year. Once completed, we will also begin plans for a bank stabilization program to complete the pond improvements.

#6 Olsen Lane is scheduled to be reconstructed. Public information meetings were held in April, and construction later in 2004.

#7 Sidewalk maintenance -The Town will be reviewing various areas of the brick work done over the years, and will be repairing a certain amount each year, as part of ongoing maintenance.

#8 The front porch of the Leigh Mansion (Municipal Building) will have some painting and wood repair work completed.

#9 Our Waste Water Treatment Plant will be upgrading the odor control facilities in the plant to assist in minimizing potential odor from the facility.

As most of you are thinking about vacation plans and the kids out of school, the full Council and I look forward to working hard this year in accomplishing these and other goals.

Shop and eat locally, supporting our downtown merchants.

Enjoy all that Clinton has to offer during the beautiful Summer months.

Department of Fire Protection by Jack Daniels



<u>Generally Speaking:</u> Now that spring/summer is finally here, please follow these safety tips. Enjoy the season and be fire smart and fire safe.

Be careful when cooking outdoors. Use of propane grills and charcoal grills can lead to an accidental fire. Keep all cooking materials in an approved container and in a safe location. Propane tanks should not to be located too close to buildings that a fire could affect the tank or grill fires affect the building. Never store propane tanks inside of your home or garage.

Please be sure to continue to practice fire safety in and around your home. Know at least two ways out of your home in an emergency. Plan for the worst and have a meeting spot for everyone to assemble at once outside.

Make sure that your hot water; heating and ventilation systems are still functioning properly. Verify that your chimneys are clear. Improper functioning devices or clogged chimneys can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.

Verify that your smoke/carbon monoxide detectors are functioning properly. These devices should be tested and cleaned regularly. Cleaning can be accomplished with a quick swipe of a vacuum cleaner

Business Owners: A function of the Uniform Fire Code is to ascertain that there is a minimum level of fire safety in buildings other than one/two family owner occupied residences. With that said, I will be verifying that buildings subject to the Uniform Fire Code are at or above that minimum level. This will include what is known as "windowless stories/basements". If your building has this type of space, there are certain minimum requirements that need to be met. Please contact my office to arrange for an appointment to visit your building.

Compliance with this State Code is for everyone's safety. Please help me to help you in the effort of maintain our town Fire Safe.

REMINDER: Regarding the sale or rental of a residence, the State Division of Fire Safety has established the fees associated with a smoke detector/carbon monoxide certificate. This fee is based on the amount of time the application is made before the closing. Please make every effort to make the application to the Town of Clinton Department of Fire Prevention as soon as you know that you are planning on selling or renting a residential occupancy.

- *Certain veterans or unmarried surviving spouses are entitled to a \$250 property tax deduction?
- *100% disabled veterans or unmarried surviving spouses may be entitled a full property tax exemption?
- *Senior citizens, disabled persons or unmarried surviving spouses may be eligible for a \$250 real property tax deduction?

Council Highlights by Colleen O'Reilly

February 10, 2004

- ~ Ordinance #04-02 was adopted, making Mountainview road from Alton place to the town line a no parking area.
- \sim The Citizen's Advisory council met on February $10^{\rm th}$ and reorganized, appointing Lou Tranquilli as chairman.
- ~ Police Chief Matheis reported that Patrolman James Kramer was recently sworn in and is performing field training.

February 24, 2004

- ~ Clinton Township Councilwoman, Antje Doyle, appeared before the Town Council to ask for support of their opposition to a proposed Regional Transportation Center (Park & Ride) to be located in Clinton Township off of Petticoat Lane. The proposal calls for a 1,000 car Park & Ride which could severely impact traffic congestion in the area. The Council agreed to continue the discussion at their next meeting.
- ~ Mayor Holt introduced the 2004 Budget thanking everyone involved for their hard work.
- ~ Mayor Holt asked Mr. Cutter to contact the NJDOT regarding the new light at the Leigh Street Bridge. The concern is that left turn directional signals were only placed on Old Route 22 and not on Leigh Street, which causes traffic to back up at busy times, like school dismissals.
- ~ The Parks & Playgrounds Summer Recreation Program is scheduled for June 28-July 23, 2004 and is open to children from Clinton and Glen Gardner. It will be held from 9 am to 12 at CPS.
- \sim The Town Picnic is scheduled for June 26th from 3 to 10 pm.

March 9, 2004

~ A letter of resignation was accepted from a long time member of the Environmental Commission,

Eva Outhwaite.

- ~ Mayor Holt addressed the proposed Clinton Township Park & Ride that was brought up at the last meeting. The Council agreed to support the re-examination of the project, proposed by Clinton Township.
- \sim Citizens Advisory reported that the Town Yard Sale is scheduled for May $15^{\rm th}$ and that fliers are available in the Clerk's office.
- ~ Councilman Bahto reported on the Rescue Squad and stated that the estimated time of completion for the new squad building is July.
- \sim Councilwoman Garber reported that a reorganization meeting of the Clinton Guild was held on March $3^{\rm rd}$, electing new officers and board members.

March 23, 2004

- ~ Mayor Holt made a Proclamation to the CPS Girl's Basketball Team congratulating them on their successful season.
- ~ Mayor Holt participated in National Book Week at CPS and read to the children.
- ~ Jennifer Feldman, Chairman of the Historic Commission, sent a letter to the Mayor resigning her position.
- ~ The Public Hearing of the 2004 Budget took place.
- ~ Mayor Holt summarized the recent discussions regarding the proposed Park & Ride in Clinton Township. Council adopted a resolution to express opposition to the Transportation Center Project for Clinton Township.
- \sim Special Event, Fleet Art in the Open was approved for Sunday, June $6^{\rm th}$.
- ~ Rubber Duckie Race and Sprintin' Clinton events to be held on July 11th were approved.
- ~ Mayor Holt thanked the Town Dinner Committee for making it a

very successful evening.

- ~ Councilwoman Kovach reported that Lori Insel is now acting chair of the Historic Commission.
- ~ Councilman Christenson thanked Sgt. Robert Krempa , who is retiring after 24 years of service. Among many other accomplishments, Sgt. Krempa started the DARE program in Clinton.

April 13, 2004

- ~ Mayor Holt thanked Cheryl Christenson and Kyle Shultz for all their years of hard work dedicated to the Town Newsletter. He presented them with gold plated plates to memorialize their dedication. Both women retired from the newsletter in December, 2003.
- ~ Mayor Holt said that he received a letter of resignation from David Osborne, member of the Board of Adjustment and liaison to the Planning Board and member of the Affordable Housing Committee. Three resumes were received and Mayor Holt recommended Chris Lindsay to fill the position on the Board of Adjustment and a motion was made and approved by the Board.

April 27, 2004

- ~ Mr. Cutter discussed the situation about the signal light at corner of Leigh Street and Route 173 and the lack of a green arrow on Leigh Street. He is continuing discussions with NJDOT to see if this can be accomplished.
- ~ The Annual Fishing Derby was a success. There were 306 attendees, 51 residents of Clinton.
- ~The North Hunterdon-Voorhees Regional High School District Budget was recently defeated by the voters. The High Bridge Council has suggested hiring an accountant to see where cuts can be made at a cost of \$15,000. The Board has decided not to participate in this suggestion.
