From the Mayor's Desk...

Foremost in my mind is an appreciation of the overwhelming number of you who

have recently volunteered your services to our Town. There is true excitement in Clinton about the upcoming changes that will have a direct and positive impact on our community. I'm thrilled that you want to contribute as we will need you. I am working with your Town Council members to make the following happen.

Our newest Councilwoman, Laurie Insel, has been busy preparing a grant application for our new Smart Growth Committee to hire a Planner to

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develop a vision plan to address some of the biggest challenges we are facing in Clinton such as traffic, parking and development. We will develop and implement a plan that will increase the economic viability of our existing historic commercial district and eventually increase our revenues through improvements in the Old Highway 22 corridor. Laurie and I will also work with Councilwoman Janice Kovach to lobby our State officials for grant funding for road improvements, Community Center renovations and fire and rescue equipment.

Councilwoman Joelle Garber will work with Councilman Gene De Cleene and lead our new Emergency Services Foundation Committee to develop a nonprofit organization that will exist to raise funds for fire and rescue equipment. This will have a direct impact on the taxpayers of Clinton while maintaining public safety through a

well-equipped Clinton Fire Department and Clinton First Aid and Rescue Squad.

Councilman Jack Harrison has devoted much of his time working to develop a shared services program in Hunterdon County. Jack and I recently attended a meeting of Hunterdon elected officials and the Chamber of Commerce to open a discussion about sharing services. Our surrounding municipalities welcome the opportunity to explore our options to save taxpayer dollars.

This summer, you can expect to see the restoration of 47 Leigh Street into office space for our Water and Sewer Departments and Historic Commission. Councilman Robert Ragozine will lead our Buildings and Grounds Committee and work with the Historic Commission to see this improvement through to its completion in the next year.

In addition to committee

work, I have worked with our Council to produce a flat municipal budget for the second year in a row for 2006.

I want to thank Nancy Smith, our Chief Financial Officer and Tax Collector, for her 31 years of devoted service to the Town of Clinton. Nancy will retire on March 31 and looks forward to spending more time with her grandchildren. I thank all of our very competent employees, especially Bob Cutter, Chief Brett Matheis and Ceil Covino for ensuring a smooth transition this year. We are very fortunate in Clinton to have a dedicated staff of professionals.

Please stop and see me during office hours on the first Monday of every month from 6:30pm to 8:00pm or make an appointment. I look forward to hearing your ideas and suggestions for an even better Clinton.

Department of Fire Prevention by Jack Daniels





To ALL APARTMENT OWNERS and HOMEOWNERS: A

smoke detector/carbon monoxide/fire extinguisher inspection certificate is required as soon as the apartment or home changes tenants or owners. Recently, the State Division of Fire Safety became the enforcing agency to verify that a FIRE EXTINGUISHER is installed in residential apartments and homes at the time of a change in ownership or tenancy. The local Fire Prevention Office is also responsible for this new law since it was enacted under the Uniform Fire Code. Therefore, I will now be checking for the presence of the proper fire extinguisher as well as the smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors during my inspection. The following is the minimum criteria necessary for an approval upon a resale or change in tenancy.

Smoke Detectors:

Any existing electrical type smoke detectors must be operational. If the device also has a battery backup feature, it too must be operational. If these devices are the type that are interconnected (when one activates they all will activate) then this feature must be working correctly. Where there are no smoke detectors present, a battery operated device is permitted to be installed.

Smoke detectors are required on each floor level in the

area of the stairs to the next floor. The idea is to detect the smoke BEFORE it starts ascending to the upper level. These devices are best located on a ceiling; however, they are allowed to be located on a wall. They should not be located in a kitchen, garage or within 5 feet of a bathroom door. Please follow the installation directions for the proper installation and location of these life saving detectors.

Carbon Monoxide Detectors:

These detectors are required only when there are ANY gas or oil appliances (range, furnace, water heater, gas fireplace, gas dryer) in the building OR when there is an attached garage. The detectors may be battery operated, plug in style or electric. The location must be within 10 feet of ALL bedrooms. The best location is on the ceiling but they may be mounted on walls. Follow the manufacturer's installation directions regarding the proper placement on a wall or ceiling.

Fire Extinguisher:

The minimum size is designated by how much fire the extinguisher is able to put out. The new law requires the minimum size to be **2A10BC**. However, this size is difficult to locate in stores. If the number on the extinguisher is larger then the extinguisher is able to put out a larger fire. As long as the number is larger then 2 or 10

respectively, the extinguisher is adequate. Additionally, ALL of the letters (A, B & C) must be on the label. The extinguisher must not weigh more then 10 pounds and must be **mounted** within 10 feet of the kitchen area. It is not allowed to be "hidden" in a closet, in a cabinet, behind a door, or in the garage. The maximum mounting height is 5 feet above the floor to the handle of the extinguisher.

Lastly, over the last 3 years, about 25% of the residential resale inspections fail the first time. Because of this high statistic, an inspection must be conducted by the inspector from the Fire Prevention Office. Until such a time as the failure rate is reduced, physical inspections of the Fire Prevention Office will be conducted. The notary option of the form should be disregarded. Remember to sign the form and submit it along with the appropriate payment as soon as possible to allow adequate time to schedule the inspection and if necessary, make any repairs. It is imperative that this certificate be issued BEFORE the sale of the home or change in tenancy of an apartment.

Shade Tree Commission by Pat Goehe



After the past snow storm I'm sure everyone will be looking for that first sign of Spring. If you are thinking of planting

any tree in your yard, here are a few tips from the National Arbor Day Foundation.`

If a tree is planted correctly it will grow twice as fast and live at least twice as long as one planted incorrectly. To plant a containerized tree, dig or roto till an area one foot deep and approximately 5 times the diameter of the root ball. The prepared soil will encourage root growth beyond the root ball and results in a healthier tree. In transplanting, be sure to keep soil around the roots. Always handle your tree by the root ball not by the trunk or branches. Don't let the root ball dry out. Help prevent root girdling by vertically cutting any roots that show tendencies to circle the root ball. After placing the

tree, pack soil firmly but not tightly around the root ball. Water the soil and place a protective 3-foot circle of mulch around the tree. Mulch will insulate the soil, retain moisture, keep out weeds, prevents soil compaction, reduces lawnmower damage, and adds aesthetic touch to a yard or street. Remove any grass within the mulch area, and area from 3 to 10 feet in diameter, depending on tree size. Pour wood chips or bark pieces 2 to 4 inches within the circle, but not touching the trunk.

HOME IMPROVEMENT CONTRACTORS

Please be careful when hiring contractors. If someone shows up at your door offering a service at a price that seems to be too good to be true, it is!

Home improvement contractors include those who work on residential driveways, sidewalks, swimming pools, patios, additions, landscaping, fences, porches, windows, doors, cabinets, kitchens, bathrooms, garages, finished basements, basement waterproofing, fire protection and security protection devices, heating and air conditioning equipment, water softeners, roofing, siding, flooring, and more.

*Get written estimates from at least three contractors. Ask them how long they've been in business, what types of insurance they have, and whether they will be using subcontractors on the project.

*Ask for, and then contact, their references. Ask whether the job was completed on time, whether there were any unexpected costs, whether the workers showed up on time and cleaned up when they finished, and whether they would use the contractor again.

*Investigate financing options for your project. Shop for credit and be sure you understand the annual percentage rate you will have to pay.

*Do not pay for the entire job up front. The customary arrangement is one-third in advance, one-third halfway through the job and one-third upon completion. Do not pay with cash.

*Obtain a written contract. Contracts for home improvement projects costing \$500 or more must be written and must include the legal name and business address of the contractor as well as a start date, a completion date, a description of the work to be done and the total price, as well as the contractor's registration number.

From the Tax Collector by Nancy Smith

The State has mailed out the applications for the 2005 property tax reimbursement (PTR) to senior citizens and disabled residents who may be eligible for the PTR Program. The deadline for filing the applications is June 1, 2006.

The PTR Program, now in its eighth year, reimburses qualified applicants for the property tax increases they incur each year. The amount of the reimbursement is the difference between the property taxes due and paid in the "base year" (the year they first became eligible for the program) and the property taxes for the cur-

rent year. Applicants must continue to meet all the income eligibility and residency requirements and must file an application each year to receive the reimbursement.

There are two different versions of the property tax reimbursement application. Form PTR-1 is for applicants who are filing an application for the first time (or who filed an application last year that was not approved for payment). Form PTR-1 applicants must provide income and property tax information for both 2004 and 2005. Form PTR-2 is sent

to applicants who received reimbursement checks for 2004. Residents applying for the 2005 reimbursement must have a total income for 2004 that was *less than* \$40,869 for single applicants and \$50,113 (combined income) for married couples, and total income for 2005 that was *less than* \$41,972 for single applicants and \$51,466 (combined income) for married couples.

Copies of the Form PTR-1 are available in the Office of the Tax Collector for residents who have not filed an application before and are eligible.

Overcrowding Ordinance: The Town of Clinton recently adopted an Ordinance regulating the rental of housing units. All landlords must register each rental property with the Town Clerk. Applications are available on the Town of Clinton website or at the Municipal Building.

The "WHALE PROGRAM."
While driving to a store
with her infant daughter,
a young mother lost control of her car and crashed
into a tree. The mother

was knocked unconscious, while the child appeared to be uninjured. Due to her injuries, the mother could not identify herself or her child. She was also unable to provide vital medical information about her daughter. The child because of her age, was unable to communicate with rescue personnel. While both victims received the best care possible, the emergency services personnel felt their rescue and treatment could have been more effective and efficient....IF THEY ONLY KNEW THE CHILDS NAME AND ANY PERTINENT EMER-GENCY INFORMATION.

In 2005 over 3,000 children age four and under were injured in automobile accidents in New Jersey. Some of those children were not riding in the same vehicles as their parents or guardians. Today, children may ride with a babysitter, grandparents or other caregivers. In the event of a

motor vehicle accident that incapacitates parents or other adult passengers, emergency service personnel have no source of information to identify the child or his/her special medical needs. Also, efforts to identify and contact the child's next of kin may be significantly delayed. In some cases, rescue efforts may proceed more smoothly and efficiently if emergency personnel know the name of the frightened child they are treating. This is where the WHALE (We Have A Little Emergency) program can make a difference.

The WHALE Program is an identification and information package for child car safety seats created by Connie Day, a caregiver from Richmond, VA, who wondered what would happen to the children in her care in the event of an automobile accident. The first program of its kind in the United States, WHALE is currently used in 33 States. It requires the use of four self adhesive stickers and one information label. One information label attached to the rear of the car seat provides important information about the child in the seat, such as

name, date of birth, medical history, and who to contact in case of an emergency. Two WHALE car seat stickers, attached to the sides of the child safety seat and two WHALE vehicle stickers, attached to the rear windows of the vehicle, depict the WHALE logo and alert rescuers that the vehicle occupants participate in the program.

The WHALE Program was brought to our attention by a concerned parent who has a child with special medical needs. This parent made it her goal to ensure that every child safety seat in New Jersey is a participant in this program.

The Clinton Police Department is proud to participate in the WHALE Program and we maintain a supply of WHALE Packages both in our headquarters and in the Town Clerk's Office. If you would like to participate in the WHALE Program please stop in and pick up your WHALE identification and information package.

On behalf of the entire membership of the Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad, we welcome our new officers and wish them well as they guide the squad into its 38th year of providing Basic Life Support (BLS) and Rescue services (vehicle extrication, water rescue, and technical rescue) to the

Town of Clinton, and portions of Clinton Twp., Lebanon Borough, Franklin Twp., and Union Twp.

The squad covers approximately 48 square miles, and answers over 1400 calls per year. They utilize a combination of paid (6am-6pm, M-F) and volunteer (remaining hours) Emergency Medical Technicians, with approximately 80 volunteer members at this time. The squad operates 4 ambulances, a rescue truck, a marine support vehicle, 3 boats, a command vehicle, a technical rescue services trailer and a first responder car.

Historic Preservation Commission by Holly Lione

The first thing people say when they find out I am a member of Clinton's Historic Preservation Commission is "Can you tell me how to research the history of my home?" The answer is the Historic Commission is surely here to help out with that.

The place to begin is with your very own deed to your home. Read it carefully and locate the portion that states when the deed for the sale previous to yours was recorded in the Hunterdon County Clerk's office. This section will state the name of the person you purchased your house from and the name of the owner before them. The wording will then go on to list the date that sale was recorded and, the most important information you are looking for, the book number and page number of that deed. It will read something like "recorded April 9, 2001 in the Hunterdon County Clerks office in Book 1998 page 810." This information is the key you need to begin unlocking the door to your homes past owners.

Now, run don't walk to the Hunterdon County Hall of Records located at 71 Main Street, Flemington, next to the Courthouse with your book number and page number in hand, (even better bring a copy of your deed). This building is open Monday-Friday 8:30-4:30. The Search room is on the first floor of the building, and there you will find books containing all the deeds recorded in Hunterdon County. You will now need to follow the numbering system and locate the book on the shelves that is sited in your current deed. Once you locate the book, turn to the page number

listed in you deed. Now, before celebrating your first successful trace, read the new deed carefully and see that names and property description match the deed with which you started out. Now, this new deed will also list a book and page number for the deed preceding it. You follow the same steps and locate the new book and page number. Continue this process as far back as you can. If you hit a roadblock, the desk staff will answer some simple questions but I found fellow researchers to be most helpful and willing to point me in the right direction. Copy machines are located in a small room off the search room, it is best to copy each deed as you find it as some may be hard to read and you will want to decipher them later at home.

Once you have gleaned all the possible nuggets of information from your deeds you have the tools you need to find out a whole lot more about those who roamed your floors before you. Census records, the internet, and local cemeteries can all be a font of information about those who lived in your home. Your computer will give you access to all kinds of places to find information. For access to census records go to http:// www.hclibrary.us/ref/ebsco.htm. This link will take you to the Hunterdon County library website. Click on "Heritage Quest" and it will ask for you library card number. Type it and hit enter. On the next page that comes up click "Search Census" then it will prompt you to enter the known information about the person for which you are searching. The 1880 census is not on

Heritage Quest for that input this link and search:

http://www.familysearch.org/Eng/Search/frameset search.asp. At the library, you can also search on Ancestry.com through their system. They have censuses as well as immigrant lists, newspaper stuff, and tons of other indexes which may reveal information about the people for which you are searching.

Input this next link to go to Hunterdon County Democrat archives 1838-1886 or so. .http://

www.njsuttonfamily.org/Newspaper/ paperhistory.htm . There is a search form at the bottom of the page. The **Hunterdon County Justice Center** has a lot of records including wills and death inventories.. Death Inventories, which were taken in the 19th century, list the contents of a home at the time of the owners death. All inventoried items were assigned a value in order to pay any debts the owner had. We were able to find out the contents of our home in 1861 and 1875 through death inventories, right down to the sleigh and grey mare in the back yard. Finally, take a stroll through our local cemeteries for things like birth and death dates of your homes residents. Many who lived here are buried here.

We all love our homes, but knowing a little more about those who came before us somehow makes us appreciate our house all the more. Feel free to contact the Historic Commission through me at lione@rcn.com for help or more information and Happy searching.

Council Highlights by Colleen O'Reilly

October 24,2005

- ~Mayor Holt commented on the Hunterdon County Municipal Officers' Association Fall Dinner/ meeting on Oct. 25th; NJ US Attorney, Christopher Christie was the guest speaker.
- ~The Clinton Fire Dept. delivered bid specs for the new fire truck. This will be discussed at the Nov. 7th Council meeting.
- ~A recommendation was received from Don Goehe, Chairman of the Environmental Commission, to appoint Bill Kruetel to the commission.
- ~Council discussed a request for a waiver of registration fees from the Clinton United Methodist Church. Council decided to waive the United Methodist fees and all other houses of worship in Clinton.
- ~A letter was received from a downtown merchant, complaining about juveniles loitering and skateboarding on his property. Sgt. Kubinak addressed the concerns and is putting together an article for the newsletter to inform residents. Building and Grounds will heck properties where skateboarding might be allowed.
- ~Councilwoman Schaumburg sug-

- gested that Building and Grounds should remind town employees to wear their employee identification so they are identifiable to residents.
- ~Councilwoman Pendergast discussed that Parks & Playgrounds met at the Community Center to go over a list of things that require attention, i.e. backboards, bathrooms & refrigerator.

November 7, 2005

- ~Mayor Holt discussed the North Hunterdon Municipal Court and the intentions of Clinton Township to withdraw from the Court.
- ~ The Planning Board has resubmitted a study regarding the Wargo tract, block 23, lot 13 (next to Krauszers). It is currently owned by A&P, whose main goal is working for the best interests of the town. The Planning Board will develop an RFP for developers.
- ~ A board of Adjustment position was open due to John Harrison being appointed to the Council. Therefore, with the opening posted, seven local residents applied for the position. Louis Tranquilli was advanced to a permanent seat, Mrs. Gallo put in as Alt. #1 and Eric Trepkau as Alt. #2.
- ~Two grants of \$10,000 each were

- awarded to the Town for a Streetscape Plan and the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan.
- ~NJ DOT requested permission to conduct nighttime work on the exit 15 reconstruction. Mayor Holt has contacted them for further details.
- ~Acting Governor Codey acknowledged receipt of our Senior Tax Freeze; it will be given attention and consideration.
- ~Overnight Parking Ordinance for Snow and Ice removal is in effect form Nov. 15 through April 1st.
