From the Mayor's Desk...



Dear Clinton Community Members, While I never wish away summer, I will be happy to say fare-

well to the bizarre weather patterns that have significantly impacted Clinton.

Many residents and business owners have asked why the Beaver Brook flooding has increased over the last few years. We believe there are several reasons. First, there has been a significant amount of development recently in the Beaver Brook basin in Clinton Township. Next, the NJ Department of Fish and Wildlife stopped allowing the NJ **Department of Transportation** (NJDOT) and our Public Works Department to trim the brush along the banks of the river. Finally, we've seen rainfall that we haven't seen before. The rainfall that caused the Beaver Brook to flood as it did on August 2nd was measured at five inches per hour.

What can we do?

After the brook flooded in July, Hunterdon County sent a crew at our request to dredge the brook near the Leigh Street Bridge in an effort to widen the channel. Unfortunately, another storm several weeks later eroded this area again. Our municipal engineer is currently working on a plan to stabilize the banks along the brook.

The Town and the NJDOT received permission to trim the banks of the Beaver Brook from the NJ Department of Environmental Protection. This has been done and will be maintained unless Fish and Wildlife orders us to stop.

The Town Council and I asked our attorney to prepare an ordinance requiring that property owners in the flood plain secure dumpsters, oil tanks and propane tanks.

The Clinton Police Department has created a phone and email chain to help notify property owners within the floodplain of floods or potential floods. If you would like to be included in this, please contact our Police Department

at (908) 736-2665. This is not fool proof. Please protect your property when you are aware of severe storms heading in our direction. The Town has sandbags that are available to you free of charge. Move property and vehicles to higher ground prior to forecasted heavy rainfall and obtain a weather radio or monitor other weather media. Please by all means do not attempt to drive or walk through flood waters.

UPCOMING EVENTS

September 7 is Labor Day, typically the last official picnic day of the summer. DO NOT store your propane tanks or grills inside. This is a sure way to cause a great deal of devistation to you and the responding emergency personnel.

October 4 to 10 is National Fire Prevention Week – take the time to look through your home and business and correct anything that appears to be a fire hazard. Visit the National Fire Prevention Association website, www.nfpa.org, for all sorts of information.

October 31 is Halloween. Please be very careful at this time of the year. Many festive events occur at this time of year that have the potential to lead to a disaster. Do not become a statistic. Practice fire safety throughout the entire year but especially during this season.

November 1 begins daylight savings time. This is when you need to change the battery in all of your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

November 26 is Thanksgiving. As we give thanks for all that we have let's take the time to thank all of the emergency volunteers that dedicate their lives to helping others in need. Many times the sacrifice that they give is at the cost of their families and the time they could be spending with them. Shade Tree Commission by Pat Goehe

PLANTING TIPS:

Fall and cool weather is approaching which means that it's a good time for planting shade trees in our yards. If planting spring flowering trees is your choice, make sure that they have already been dug by the nurser



that they have already been dug by the nursery. If that's not the case, it's best to wait until Spring.

When mulching trees, it's advisable to keep mulch about 3 to 4 inches from the trunk of the tree and not placed on or "volcanoed" around the trunk.

Solid Waste Disposal Hunterdon County Transfer Station Saturdays, 10:30 am to 1:00 pm

The Hunterdon County Transfer Station, located at 10 Petticoat Lane in Annandale, is open to Hunterdon County residents to dispose of bulky household trash Saturdays from 10:30 am to 1:00 pm. You must be a private individual, using a privately licensed passenger or farm vehicle under 8,000 pounds gross weight.

Keep in mind that the transfer station does not supply help with the off-loading. There is a fee which must be paid in cash.

Refrigerators, freezers, and air conditioners need a Freon removal certification. Construction debris must be in 4' sections or shorter. Liquids, hazardous waste, leaves, and grass clippings are not accepted.

How To Save Water in the Bath-<u>room</u>

The bathroom is where most of the home's water is used, so it is the place where you can save and the most.

Toilets:

1. Flush only when necessary.

2. Install a water-saving displacement device.

3. Check overflow pipes to be sure that water is not draining. Simply add dark food coloring to TANK water. DON'T FLUSH! Check water in TOILET BOWL 15-20 minutes later. Color in the toilet bowl means you have a leak.

1. Fill sink with water instead of letting water run when you wash, brush teeth or shave.

2. Repair leaks and attend to drips promptly.

3. Install water saving devises. Try a faucet aerator to reduce amount of water used.

Tub or Shower:

1. Take shallow baths and plug the drain before you run water. Keep showers short with pressure at low force.

2. Install water-saving devices. Use a low-flow shower head, flow restrictor or cut off valve.

Do & Don'ts for Green Living

1. Replace your burnt out light bulbs with compact fluorescent energy saving light bulbs.

2. Turn off computers to save energy when not in use.

3. Set computer to go to sleep when it has been idle for more than 10 minutes. Screensavers may be pretty, but

they do not save energy!

4. Recycling is one of the basic practices of green living. Reuse is even better than recycling! If you can reuse or donate an item instead of recycling it, there will be less total waste and less energy used to produce a new item altogether.

OTHER TOWN UPDATES

The Roads Committee has decided to recommend to the Council to make changes to the Town's Winter Overnight Parking Rules this season. The proposal would allow overnight parking except on nights roads are snow covered. If we have snow-covered roads and cars are on the street, they must be removed or be towed. The status of the Council's ruling will be provided on the Town website by October and will also be addressed in the December Town Newsletter.

SCHOOL'S BACK IN SESSION

With the new school year beginning we ask that parents review these important safety practices themselves as well as with their children to help make this a SAFE year for everyone traveling to and from CPS.

The official walking routes to Clinton Public School are as follows:

From the west take the sidewalk along West Main Street past the Clinton House onto Main Street, turn right on Leigh Street south and continue across Route 173 with the Crossing Guard, continue south to the Crossing Guard at the CPS Bike Path and then up the hill to CPS. (DO NOT WALK UP SCHOOL STREET unless accompanied by an adult) From Halstead/Center Street cross with the Crossing Guard stationed at Leigh Street at Center Street, continue south on Leigh Street and then continue as outlined above. From Alton Place or the South cross with either the Crossing Guard at Alton Place or at the CPS Bike Path. Children are not to walk along Route 173 between the South Branch River and Leigh Street unless they are accompanied by an adult.

The very nature of Leigh Street, School Street and the CPS parking lot itself is not conducive to the efficient flow of the traffic volume generated in the morning and afternoon by parents delivering or picking up children directly at CPS. However, should you still choose to drive your children to CPS please plan to leave EARLY. Morning rush hour Interstate 78 traffic is extremely unpredictable and it DIRECTLY IMPACTS ALL TRAF-FIC here in Town and will inevitably delay your arrival at CPS. To ease congestion in the CPS parking lot we strongly urge parents to allow their children to walk to school or to utilize Riverside Drive for drop off's and pick-ups. Parents that do choose to deliver children directly to CPS must immediately make their drop off and proceed away from the curb as to not block other vehicles or buses. <u>No vehicle will be permitted to park or stand in front of CPS in the Bus</u> Lane or Fire Lane.

Our School Crossing Guards are worth their weight in gold to the Police Department and to the Town as the first line of protection for our children walking to and from CPS. Parents, please reinforce with your child the importance of obeying all instructions from our Crossing Guards. Motorists, please be courteous and patient with our Crossing Guards while they are at their posts safeguarding our children. Our Guards are empowered to report motorists who they observe breaking traffic laws to the Police Department for prosecution and to report improper behavior on the part of students to CPS Staff. The job of a Crossing Guard is hot in the summer, cold in the winter, wet when it rains, frustrating when motorists or children are difficult and ignore their instructions, so the next time you see one of them please smile and wave and above all thank them for the job that they do!

If a parent or a student observes ANY activity or behavior on their way to or from CPS that they feel is suspicious or "out of the ordinary"

they should report it IMMEDIATLEY to a Crossing Guard, a Police Officer or CPS Staff. Unfortunately suspicious activity is all too often not reported until "the next day" when there is little if anything that can be investigated or done about it. And one final reminder, although there are Police Officers on-duty and patrolling Clinton 24/7, Police Headquarters is not staffed fulltime therefore unless otherwise instructed, to immediately contact a Police Officer you must call our Communications Center at 908-735-8611 where you will reach one of our civilian dispatchers.

NEW ORDINANCES

<u>Smoking Prohibited by Minors in Any</u> <u>Public Place</u>: Chapter 128 prohibits smoking in any public place by anyone under the age of 18.

Smoking Prohibited in all Parks, Playgrounds and Park Facilities: Chapter 105 prohibits smoking in all Town parks, playgrounds and other park facilities.

Established Hours of Operation for <u>Town Parks and Playgrounds</u>: Chapter 105 establishes hours of operation for all Town Parks and Open Space. Hunts Mills Park 6am to10pm. De-Mott Pond 6am to 10pm. Community Center and facilities 6am to 10pm or upon conclusion of sanctioned activities inside the Center. Basketball courts, tennis courts and baseball fields are open for play beginning at 7am until 10pm.

Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad by Chad Newsome



September ushers out the end of summer and, for children, welcomes in the arrival of a new school year! As your

children start their new academic year, the Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad reminds parents to take a moment to introduce or review general child safety tips.

Whenever children are outside playing, there are questions we need to ask our children and ourselves:

- 1. Is your child safe playing outside?
- 2. When your child is playing outside, do they know how to be safe?
- 3. Does your child know what to do if an emergency occurs?

Do you know what to do if your child is injured?

Do not assume that your children know how to play safe and that they would know what to do in an emergency situation. Children need to be taught what to do. Listed below are a few things you should talk to your children about:

- Do not to talk to strangers and tell your children why it is dangerous.
- Always play in groups and never by themselves.
- Always wear a helmet and pads when riding their bikes, scooters, skateboards and roller-blades. Explain to them what could happen if they fall and strike their head.
- Always inform an adult when they are playing away from the house and make sure that they know how to get help if an emergency arises.

Review how to get an ambulance if an emergency happens.

Do you know what to do if your child becomes injured while playing?

> The first thing for you to do is to stay CALM. If you are calm, it will help your iniured child stay calm and not increase any chance of further injury.

- Call or have someone call 911. Make sure to give all information about the injury to the 911 operator.
- Keep the injured child from moving and have them lay still until the ambulance arrives.
- If the child has a bleeding wound. cover it with a clean cloth and apply direct pressure to the wound with your hand.
- If the child appears to have a fracture to either their arm or leg, ensure that the extremity does not move.

If the child is found to be unconscious, leave the child in position found and call 911.

While September is filled with school, sporting and extra curricular events, take a moment to review these general safety tips with your children. Council Highlights by Susan Komorowski

<u>May 12, 2009</u>

~Preliminary discussion of development of the former Moebus Tract presented to the Planning Board. Next step is the fiscal impact analysis for the use of the property.

~Mayor Schaumburg has been appointed to the Conference of Mayors Executive Board and is a Vice President and Treasurer. She will be testifying before our Legislature on a regular basis and working on our behalf.

~Mayor Schaumburg reported a onecent increase in this year's budget, with a 2.3% increase in our tax levy. State aid decreased by \$5182.

~Roads Committee continues to sell engraved bricks to be used in the renovation of the walkway between Main Street and the Municipal Parking Lot.

~Clinton Rescue Squad has gained two new members, reports 183 dispatches for April, and their new rig is expected to arrive by the end of the month.

<u>May 26, 2009</u>

~Introduction of amendment to Ordinance regarding water rates to address concerns by residential multifamily dwellings with bulk meters.

~Roads Committee reviewing plans for Union Road. Brick sale ongoing for alleyway, and two benches have been ordered.

<u>June 9, 2009</u>

~A Resolution was made to participate in the Local Government Energy Audit Program.

~Knights of Columbus and the Newcomers Club has scheduled their annual Chili Cook-Off for September 12th at the Clinton First Aid and Rescue Squad Building.

~Richard Miller was appointed to the Historical Preservation Commission.

<u>June 23, 2009</u>

~Public comment—concerns expressed regarding violations for temporary signs posted in town. Mayor suggested a closer review of the temporary sign section of the Town sign ordinance with regard to residents.

~Mr. Cutter reports recycling is a huge savings for the Town—he would like to see residents recycle more of the cardboard that is being thrown in their regular trash.

~The North Hunterdon Rotary is helping to lay the bricks in the alleyway.

~Passed Resolution to announce the Town of Clinton's intent to withdraw from participation in the Municipal Court of North Hunterdon.

~Peter Ball appointed as Building Sub-Code Official and Alternate Building Inspector.

~Kevin Fleming appointed as Construction Official and Building Inspector.

July 14, 2009

~Mayor Schaumburg discussed amending the current peddler's license.

~Mayor Schaumburg explained the Bond Ordinance to cover several projects, including the water storage tank, rehabilitation of the existing water tank, Leigh Street water main replacement, and well disinfection.

~A resolution was passed to create a Green Team to satisfy one of the requirements on an application to Sustainable Jersey for a grant.

~Mr. Shea reported that volunteers will be installing the bricks in the alleyway this coming weekend.

~Mr. Cutter reported on starting a community garden in the Town.

July 28, 2009

~Mayor Schaumburg updated Council regarding the abolishment of the Glen Gardner Board of Education, effective July 1, 2009.

~Adoption of Ordinance to amend Chapter 75 of our code to exempt filming crews of four or fewer persons.

~Alleyway on Main Street completed—next is replacement of benches and street lamps, and paving the lot.

~Emergency Services to host Casino Night and Raffle October 9th at Beaver Brook Country Club.
