From the Mayor's Desk...



It's hard to believe that summer is over and school has begun. First I would like to thank former Councilwoman Maria Valenta for her service to the Town and also to wel-

come Councilman Brad Cohen who was selected to replace Maria on Council.

This past summer also brought a historic event – the 2012 Summer Olympics. It was especially exciting because North graduate and Clinton resident, Julie Culley competed in the 5000M. We are so proud of her – she is an inspiration to all of us. Julie is the epitome of grace – and such a talented athlete. We wish her continued success.

We have been busy with a number of projects. The town wide revaluation is under way and will be completed by the end of the year (and we appreciate your assistance in completing this project), Department of Transportation is working on its milling and paving of West Main St. (Route 173). Our budget process is beginning earlier than usual this year as the Town has experienced some severe financial setbacks including but not limited to the \$12M loss of ratables. The revaluation will help stabilize the ratable base and balance the property values. What I will say is that it does not automatically mean that property taxes will go down – I don't want to set false expectations. Our new Tax Assessor Fran Kuczynski is available to answer any questions and/or explain the process – please feel free to reach out to her.

Another project underway is the dissolution of the North Hunterdon Municipal Court. Although it was a difficult decision – the cost of maintaining the court has become cumbersome. The loss to the Town of Clinton in 2011 was more than \$90K - the last several years has seen a decline in court revenue with other municipalities removing themselves from the joint court. In January of 2013 Clinton will officially share a court with another Hunterdon municipality. At the time I am writing this letter no final decision as to which court has been made - however there will be significant savings to the Town of Clinton.

There are several events coming up this fall including the Sprintin Clinton 5K run hosted by the Clinton Sunrise Rotary, the Farmer's Market will continue to run every Sunday from 9am to 1pm in

the Clinton Fire House parking lot through the end of October.

Of course it wouldn't be Halloween without the Haunted Mill at the Red Mill Museum Village on October 12, 13, 19, 20, 26 and 27. November then brings Dickens Days on the Friday, Saturday and Sunday following Thanksgiving and the Christmas parade the first Friday in December. I hope you can all attend all of the holiday events in town including the Christmas tree and Menorah lighting One last reminder is parking there are 8 additional spaces on Main Street and East Main Street with the completion of the road project, there is also parking in the Lower Center Street lot, the Water Street lot (on the corner of Water and Halstead Streets) and the Municipal Building parking lot (corner of Leigh and Route 173). Keep in mind there are time limits on the parking and our officers are marking tires and ticketing.

Code Enforcement by Jack Daniels

A Helping Hand:

You're a homeowner and you want to finish your basement so that your kids have a place to hang out and play or you want to have a deck on the back of your house for the summer barbecues. You're handy and can do these things yourself, after all, it's not too difficult to put up some walls or frame out a deck right? So that's just what you do, turn your idea into reality and start construction. The problem here is that you neglected to involve the town officials appointed to regulate these things. Officials appointed by the Town Council who is authorized to do so via State Regulations.

"Bureaucracy!", you say. "Government always trying to get into my life!", you say.

There's good reason for such involvement in this aspect of your life. It's due to past experiences and the result of others doing the same thing which has been proven to eventually result in disaster. Many folks are unaware that there are reasons why the zoning, fire and construction codes mandate certain things be done in certain ways. These codes are typically based on past experiences that have caused and created a change for the better. Most of the fire code regulations are a result of this. The State government officials recognized that too many losses were the result of fires. So a Fire Safety Commission was appointed to study this. This commission reported that through a Statewide Fire Code, losses could be both prevented and reduced. As with many government changes there was resistance. Strong perseverance established a Statewide Uniform Fire Code aimed at protecting the public at large from the tragedies of fire.

Large and tragic fires had already occurred throughout the State for many many years before the fire code was established in 1985. The Uniform Fire Code has evolved into a large document that not only involves fire safety in businesses and public areas, but the certification of training instructors, firefighter and investigation training, licenses for fire protection contractors, and requirements for certain firematic identification emblems to be placed on certain structures just to name a few items within the fire code. I became a certified inspector in 1987 and since then the fire code has come a long way; all started because a few who recognized the importance that sometimes mandated regulations do help society.

At times we are our own worst enemy and it is all of us that have caused the need for many of the regulations, laws and guidelines that exist today. The next time you want to do anything that requires the involvement of a government office or official, please try to remember that the official involved has a specific level of training that is necessary to carry out the duty charged to them. Ask for guidance from the official instead of meeting them with resistance. Most officials are more than willing to explain the reasons behind the codes that they enforce. I'm an instructor of the building, fire and housing codes and teach throughout the State. I welcome the opportunity to explain the codes I enforce. My job existence is based on the fact that not everyone will adhere to the regulations and learn from past violations. More often than not, the fire code violations I note are the same ones that were found in previous years. Please help yourself and everyone involved with your life or business by learning from the past. Make your surroundings a better code compliant place and everyone will benefit. And when you can, lend a helping hand to others; they may benefit from your past experiences. Our State has proven that codes of this nature can help society. Please help to continue the trend.

<u>Leigh Street Water Main</u> <u>Replacement—Downtown Water</u> <u>Main Replacement—Downtown</u> <u>Drainage/Sidewalk Improve-</u> <u>ments</u>

With the exception of a few housekeeping issues, all of the work associated with the four projects above have been completed.

<u>Filter Replacement and Up-</u> <u>grades at the Waste Water Treat-</u> <u>ment Plant</u>

This much needed replacement will replace the old filter mechanism with a new one that will be more efficient. Construction has begun and is expected to be completed within a few months.

Beaver Brook Well #11

In order to increase the quality of potable water pumped from this well, a chlorinator is being installed at this location. Construction has begun and will be completed within a couple of weeks.

Well #4 Filter Installation

In order to increase the quality of potable water pumped from this well, a new filter will be installed. Construction has begun and will be completed by mid-September.

Reminders:

The garbage collection services that are provided by the Town are for residential customers only. Commercial entities are required to arrange for private collection. The trash cans located throughout the Town are for trash generated by pedestrians, not for commercial or residential use.

Collection of residential brush began several months ago. We request that all residents adhere to this schedule and not place any brush on the curb until a few days before the scheduled collection date. This will minimize the amount of time large piles of brush are located in the street, which will ensure that the road is clear to vehicular traffic. The collection dates are available via our website at <u>www.clintonnj.gov</u>.

In the near future, the Town will be auctioning off surplus vehicles and equipment via an internet-based auction through GovDeals.com. Keep an eye on our website to see when the auction will commence. If you have not already registered for updates relating to the Town of Clinton, visit our website and click on "Register to Receive Web News".

While there are many affordable housing units available in Town, currently there are none available for sale. Even though there is nothing available, we encourage anyone looking for affordable housing to get "prequalified" through the Town so when units become available, you are ahead in the process. These units offer a valuable opportunity for income qualified participants to become homeowners in Clinton. SAFE ROUTES TO AND

As the new school year begins we ask that parents please review some important

safety practices with their children to help make this a SAFE year for everyone traveling to and from CPS.

The official walking routes to Clinton Public School are as follows:

From the west take the sidewalk along West Main Street past the Clinton House onto Main Street, turn right on Leigh Street south and continue across Route 173 with the Crossing Guard, continue south to the Crossing Guard at the CPS Bike Path and then up the hill to CPS. (DO NOT WALK UP SCHOOL STREET unless accompanied by an adult) From Halstead/Center Street cross with the Crossing Guard stationed at Leigh Street at Center Street, continue south on Leigh Street and then continue as outlined above. From Alton Place or the South cross with either the Crossing Guard at Alton Place or at the CPS Bike Path. Children are not to walk along Route 173 between the South Branch River and Leigh Street unless they are accompanied by an adult.

The very nature of Leigh Street, School Street and the CPS parking lot itself is not conducive to the efficient flow of the traffic volume generated in the morning and afternoon by parents delivering or picking up children directly at CPS. However, if you still choose to drive your children to CPS please plan to leave EARLY. Morning rush hour Interstate 78 traffic is extremely unpredictable and it DI-RECTLY IMPACTS ALL TRAFFIC here in Town and will inevitably delay your arrival at CPS. To ease congestion in the CPS parking lot we strongly urge parents to allow their children to walk to school or to utilize Riverside Drive for drop off's and pick-ups. <u>Parents that do choose to</u> <u>deliver children directly to CPS must</u> <u>immediately make their drop off and</u> <u>proceed away from the curb as to not</u> <u>block other vehicles or buses. No vehicle will be permitted to park or stand in front of CPS in the Bus</u> <u>Lane or Fire Lane.</u>

Aside from parents, our School Crossing Guards are the first line of protection for our children walking to and from CPS. Parents, please reinforce with your child the importance of obeying all instructions from our Crossing Guards. Motorists, please be courteous and patient with our Crossing Guards while they are at their posts safeguarding our children. Our Guards are empowered to report motorists who they observe breaking traffic laws to the Police Department for prosecution, and to report improper behavior on the part of students to CPS Staff. The job of a Crossing Guard is hot in the summer, cold in the winter, wet when it rains and frustrating when motorists or children are difficult and ignore their instructions, so the next time you see one of them please smile, wave and above all appreciate them for the very important job that they do.

If a parent or a student observes ANY activity or behavior on their way to or from CPS that they feel is suspicious or "out of the ordinary" they should report it IMMEDIAT-LEY to a Crossing Guard, a Police Officer or CPS Staff. Unfortunately suspicious activity is all too often not reported until "the next day" when there is little if anything that can be investigated or done about it. And one final reminder, although there are Police Officers on-duty and patrolling Clinton 24/7, Police Headquarters is not staffed fulltime therefore unless otherwise instructed, to immediately contact a Police Officer you must call our Communications Center at **908-735-8611** where you will reach one of our civilian dispatchers.

ORDINANCE REMINDERS

Smoking Prohibited by Minors in Any <u>Public Place</u>: Chapter 128 prohibits smoking in any public place by anyone under the age of 18.

Smoking Prohibited in all Parks, Playgrounds and Park Facilities: Chapter 105 prohibits smoking in all Town parks, playgrounds and other park facilities.

Established Hours of Operation for <u>Town Parks and Playgrounds</u>: Chapter 105 establishes hours of operation for all Town Parks and Open Space. Hunts Mills Park 6am to10pm. De-Mott Pond 6am to 10pm. Community Center and facilities 6am to 10pm or upon conclusion of sanctioned activities inside the Center. Basketball courts, tennis courts and baseball fields are open for play beginning at 7am until 10pm.


Historic Commission by Rosemarie Platt

History is in the making at the Town of Clinton Historic Preservation commission. During the Fall season our Town comes alive with the Red Mill Museum's Haunted Mill and The Downtown Guild's annual Pumpkin Carving Contest.

Council Highlights by Sue Komorowski

<u>May 8, 2012</u>

~Public Comment addressed concerns regarding the timing of brush pickup. Council reminds residents to be more aware of pickup schedule, and that landscapers should haul their debris away, not leave it for Town pickup.

~Senior Luncheon held May 6th was well-attended by 65 Town seniors.

~Adopted Resolution whereas the Town has expressed their intent to withdraw from the North Hunterdon Municipal Court, effective December 31, 2012.

~Introduced Ordinance authorizing improvements by and for the Town of Clinton Sewer Utility and appropriating the sum of \$125,000 from the Sewer Capital Improvement Fund for upgrades, flow study, and replacement parts.

~Introduced Ordinance to appropriate \$345,000 from the Water Capital Improvement Fund for meter automation, emergency power upgrades, disinfecting, and a new vehicle for the Town of Clinton Water Utility.

~Introduction of Bond Ordinance for various Capital improvements such as replacing the Community Center door, painting the Municipal building, acquiring equipment consisting of chipper, diesel fuel tank, and zero turn mower, playground repairs, Council Room chairs, and computer upgrades.

~Shade Tree dedicated Arbor Day planting to Pat and the late Don Goehe. The Town has been named Tree City USA again.

May 22, 2012

~Bruce Pearson of Broadcasting for Video Venue presented benefits of having his company provide online webcast of Town meetings and events of the Town website. There would be no cost to the Town, and it would promote tourism and film clips of the Town. Mr. Pearson is addressing Council and attorney Cushing's concerns about controlling and protecting site content and will follow up. ~Motion to adopt Resolution authorizing use of competitive contracting for soliciting proposals for town-wide property revaluation.

~Resolution authorizing membership in the Somerset County Cooperative Purchasing System at no cost to the Town. The Town is also a member of both Hunterdon and Morris County Co-ops.

June 12, 2012

~Mayor Kovach received petition generated by Clinton merchants opposing the closing of Main Street during Black Potatoe Festival, and their disapproval of how the Town has neglected to keep merchants apprised of Main St. closures in either a timely or meaningful manner.

~Presentation by Forest Pest Outreach regarding invasive pests entering the U.S. from China, specifically the Emerald Ash Borer and the Asian Long-horned Beetle, which is now found in NJ and causing destruction to trees. Residents encouraged to NOT buy firewood outside a 15 mile radius to help keep these pest out of our area.

~Accepted, with regret, the resignation of Councilwoman Maria Valenta, whose term was to expire December 2014.

~Merchants requesting compensation for pavers that were removed during the Downtown project and updated with handicap-accessible corners. Council will follow up on these requests.

~Rescue Squad received 225 calls in May, up 25%.

~New asphalt laid on Lower Center Street and Main, and 8 additional parking spaces have been added to downtown Main and East Main Streets.

~Black Potatoe Festival planning allows proceeds for parking to benefit both the Clinton Fire Dept. and the Booster Club at Clinton Public School.

June 26, 2012

 ${\sim}Award$ of contract to Oswald Enterprises in the amount of \$13,000 for

the rehabilitation and televising of two manholes.

~Adopted Resolution regarding the hiring of a part-time Tax Assessor, newly-filled by Frances Kuczynski.

~The 22nd Annual Cleanup of the South Branch of the Raritan River removed 4 tons of trash and recyclables by 537 volunteers at 26 sites!

~The Town received a \$14,000 Historic Grant from the Hunterdon County Freeholders, which will help complete painting and fencing at Gebhardt Field Grandstand.

~Adopted Resolution authorizing Mayor and Town Clerk to enter into agreed settlement and resolve a nearly-two-year dispute with the Hunterdon Art Museum over payment for patio and parking construction at the Museum.

July 10, 2012

~Resolution passed to establish a uniform policy permitting and regulating the location of donation boxes around the Municipal building for non profit organizations.

~Council interviewed candidates to fill Councilwoman Valenta's vacancy. Council appointed Brad Cohen.

~Town Picnic scheduled for Saturday, September 8th, with a rain date of September 22, 2012. Fireworks and B.Y.O.B. approved.

July 24, 2012

~Public session had Clinton merchants and residents expressing both displeasure and gratitude over the closing of Main Street for the Black Potatoe Festival. Some commented the event brought more people to Town. Councilman Pendergast also wanted to clarify that the Town did NOT contribute \$45,000 to the event as was rumored.

~Adopted Resolution to award contract to Appraisal Systems, Inc, for the Town-wide revaluation.

~Police Chief Matheis reports no issues were reported during the Black Potatoe Festival. The Town's preparation was flawless.
