MAYOR'S COMMENTS

Mayor Kovach reported that Governor Murphy announced increased capacity limits for indoor businesses and indoor and outdoor gatherings going into effect Friday, March 19, 2021 at 6:00 a.m. Indoor capacity limits increase from 35 percent to 50 percent excluding employees. Indoor gathering increase 10 to 25 people and outdoor gatherings 25 to 50 people.

Mayor Kovach met with three other Bipartism New Jersey Mayors highlighting the overwhelming need for President Biden's American Rescue Plan and the relief communities need which is finally on the way. Biden's Rescue Plan will not only dramatically bolster vaccination efforts to defeat the virus and provide \$1,400 direct relief checks to struggling Americans, but it also sets aside \$350 billion in direct assistance to state and local governments to keep essential services up and running and local municipalities above water. The \$1,400 in direct payments will be to individuals making less than \$75,000 and couples making less than \$150,000. Adult dependents, citizen spouses and children living in mixed-status families are also eligible.

WHEREAS, the Town has received a completed Water Reservation Application # L20-12, dated November 25, 2020, submitted in the name of SNG Properties/Tejomaya, LLC (Town of Clinton, Block 3, Lot 2, Tax Map Page 1, located at 111 West Main Street); and

WHEREAS, on December 9, 2020, the Town's Water Consulting Engineer, Suburban Consulting Engineers, informed the Town of Clinton Water Committee of their recommendation of a conditional approval of the afore-mentioned application which proposes development of a 110 Unit Assisted Living Facility; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance 15-1, the Town's Water Committee has up to ninety (90) days to approve or deny an application: and

WHEREAS, on February 17, 2021, the Town's Water Committee held their monthly meeting in which they have reviewed and granted **CONDITIONAL** approval of said application with the following conditions:

• Once the site ceases operation as a hotel, the site shall be granted a reservation of water supply in an amount not to exceed 11,280 gpd. The applicant shall submit copies of all site approvals and associated plans to the Water Department. The applicant shall prepare water demand calculations in accordance N.J.A.C. 7: I 0-12.6 for the approved plans and submit to the Water Department for their review. If the average day demands for the proposed facilities as calculated for the approved plans exceed 11,280 gpd the applicant shall apply for a separate water reservation for the amount in exceedance.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that in accordance with Chapter 142, Section 1, Sub-section J(3) of the Town's Ordinances, the Mayor and Council hereby approves Water Reservation Application # L20-12 in the amount of 11, 280, to which said approval is valid for a period of twelve (12) months.

RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO SENATE BILL 53375

WHEREAS The Statewide Insurance Fund ("Fund") was created to provide a costefficient means of supplying workers' compensation benefits to injured municipal and other public employees including emergency volunteers; and

WHEREAS, the Fund is not a traditional, profit-making insurance company, but rather is composed of individual municipalities, counties, municipal utilities authorities and other local government entities whose budges are all funded by taxpayer or public rate payers; and

WHEREAS, because the Fund's members are funded, in large, by tax dollars, and because the Fund has determined that Senate Bill 3375 will increase workers compensation costs drastically, creating an undo burden to the taxpayers and rate payers of its members; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 3375 requires significant changes to the Workers' Compensation Act where current law already has provisions in place to protect injured workers from claim abuse and requires all reasonable and necessary medical care be provided in a timely manner, subject to penalty; and

WHEREAS, Any communications between the patient, a physician, a joint insurance fund, an insurance carrier and its representative, are already governed by Court Rules, the rules of evidence, and both medical and legal ethical standards; and

WHEREAS the hallmark of the New Jersey Workers Compensation Act is the obligation of the employer to provide medical benefits to an injured worker, as long as the injury or illness arises out of and in the course of employment, tantamount with the obligation to provide medical case, is the employer's statutory right to authorize the medical provider and the treatment to be administered. This bill would do nothing more than shift the entire balance of an already equitable system, to one side, to the detriment and greater cost of the employer.

WHEREAS Senate Bill 3375 will not serve the interest of the taxpayers and rate payers in New Jersey because it will increase the costs associated with workers' compensation claims be at least 35% and these costs will be borne by the taxpayers of individual municipalities, counties, municipal utilities authorities and other public rate payers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Clinton strongly opposes the adoption of Senate Bill 3775 and urges the Governor, State Senators and Assemblymen to protect taxpayers and rate payers from unnecessary and unwarranted charges; and

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCE #21-08 – CROSS STREET BANNER REGULATIONS

A motion was made by Ms. Intrabartola, seconded by Ms. Karsh, to introduce Ordinance #21-08 on first reading as submitted:

TOWN OF CLINTON

HUNTERDON COUNTY, NEW JERSEY

ORDINANCE # 21-08

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Town of Clinton desire to amend the Code of the Town of Clinton to clarify the restrictions on hanging a cross-street banner on East Main Street.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Clinton, the County of Hunterdon, that the Code of the Town of Clinton "Code") is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 122-42 of the Code, entitled "Banners over public roads" is hereby amended as follows: (1) those portions of the Code set forth below are hereby amended as follows (additions noted in bold italics *thus* and deletions noted in strikethrough thus); and (2) portions of the Code not set forth below shall remain unchanged:

- A. Signs or banners shall not be stretched, hung, or otherwise placed over or across any public road, except when authorized by a Street Banner Permit issued by the Town. The Mayor and Council may permit banner signs to be placed over the west end of East Main Street, subject to the following conditions:
- 1) Any organization wishing to erect install a banner pursuant to this Section shall complete an application and file it with the Town Clerk at least 30 days prior to the date on which the sign banner will be installed erected. The application shall contain the following information:
- 2) Cross street banners installed pursuant to this section must adhere to the following specifications. Each banner shall have two double stitched reinforced hems, wind slits, and connect to building with rope placed through the upper and lower hems. The size of the banner sign shall not be greater than 24 feet long and four feet high and shall have a square footage no larger than 96 square feet. However, banners must be at least forty-five (45) feet long in total to the end of the ropes. Banners may be double-sided. For double-sided banners, only one face of the banner shall be counted in determining square footage. Banners shall be made of a material resistant to ultraviolet rays, mold and mildew.
 - 3) The banner may contain only the following information:
 - a) The name of the organization.
 - b) The name of the event.
 - c) The date, time and location of the event.
- 4) The Town may refuse the placement of banners which are in poor condition. In addition, the Town Administrator has the authority to order the removal of banners which have become frayed, ripped or otherwise unsightly.
- 4)5) The banner sign shall only be installed by the Town of Clinton Fire Company, which may charge a reasonable fee for installing the banner. *Organizations requesting the installation of a banner sign must cooperate with the Town of Clinton Fire Company regarding installation of the banner.*
- 6) The banner may only be displayed for a maximum of thirty (30) days, but cannot be displayed more than thirty (30) days prior to the event or seven (7) days following the event. However, the Town Council reserves the right to shorten the time a banner may be displayed in order to accommodate other requests to install a banner.

5-7) Permission to locate a banner sign shall only be granted to charitable, cultural, civic or community organizations to announce specific events to be held within the boundaries of the Town of Clinton or which support events in which Town of Clinton organizations are participating and have expressed their support through a letter or electronic communications. Banner signs pursuant to this Section are not to be used for commercial advertising; however, the logo of a business, entity, or corporation sponsoring an event may be included on a banner.

whose purpose is to serve the residents of the Town of Clinton to advertise cultural, civic, or community events benefiting the Town of Clinton. Banner signs pursuant to this Section are not to be used for commercial advertising; however, the logo of a business, entity, or corporation sponsoring an event may be included on a banner.

SECTION 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed as to such inconsistencies.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall take effect upon final passage and publication according to law.
