PUBLIC COMMENTS

Peter Ochs, 36 Haver Farm Road, came before council to express his concerns over the odor emanating from the wastewater treatment plant. Mr. Ochs stated this a huge problem and a quality of life issue. Mr. Phelan explained that laborers from the treatment plant have pulled off manholes in the area and no backups appear to exist. The recent upgrades at the treatment plant provided new filters and a more efficient process. The matter is of great concern and there will be discussions with the treatment plant operators to see if there can be a solution to the problem.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS

- 1. Mayor Kovach asked for a moment of silence upon learning that former Councilwoman and Mayor, Christine Schaumburg, passed away this morning. Ms. Schaumburg served on Council in 2005 and served as mayor from 2006 through June 2011.

Police Chief Kubinak
